PRINCIPALS REPORT

Dear parents and caregivers

Scripture- Special Education Religious

I have had a great response to date from families new to the school indicating that they did not want to send their child to scripture if that was a possibility, with the understanding that normal school teaching and learning would be the alternative. However there were a small number of families that did tick the box for their children to remain enrolled in Catholic or Anglican scripture. For Term 1 we will continue with our current program until further notice. We will not be offering Scripture or Ethics to Kindergarten this term until they are well settled into the school routine and as yet we do not have an Ethics teacher for Year 1.

U R Strong- more people to sign up

Last year we introduced **U R Strong** as a part of our wellbeing program and we offered parent and child workshops to introduce the notion of how friendships work and how to maintain and keep healthy relationships with friends. The parent and child workshop this year will be on Thursday March 21. We have 17 families organised for the K-2 session but only a few for the 3-6 session. We will combine the sessions into one if we do not get many more takers. If you went along last year and got something out of it please share with your fellow parents. Class make up

I understand there may be some discussion happening with families new to Camdenville PS about class make up. In reality classes made up of children of the same age or year group are part of our school system today simply because they reflect how educational administrators originally set up schools, not because they were found to reflect good educational practice. This model of schooling was intended to prepare workers for the factory societies of the 1850s.

We advocate for stage based classes at Camdenville PS and have done so for the past 8 years. Some people describe this as composite classes. There are a number of reasons for this but here are the two main ones. Firstly, NSW syllabuses are based on a learning progression from Year K to 12. Apart from Kindergarten, each stage (i.e Years 1 and 2 or Years 3 and 4) consists of a two year continuum of learning. A child may be anywhere along that continuum for the various subject areas and teachers are skilled at identifying where a child is along that progression of learning and will differentiate learning opportunities based on that identified need.

The second reason is that in reality all classrooms whether stage based or year/age based are made up of a range of student learning needs-(a real composite) so when we organise our classes, which takes a good deal of time and thinking- we make sure there is a range of learners in each class to support one another, to allow fluid grouping to occur, and to match strengths and areas of needs to ensure the best possible learning environment.

Some future focused schools are exploring entirely different approach to school set ups. Listen to an interview with the principal of the newly developed Linfield Learning Village. This new school will take an entirely "stage not age" approach, in which students advance based on their progress rather than their year level.

Pupils will be divided into K-12 'home bases' of about 350. Older students will be encouraged to mentor and teach younger ones.

Each student will have their own 'learning pathway', monitored by a 'learning mentor'. And the school will teach through projects that engage several disciplines together, rather than focusing on one at a time.

Now that's something for us to aim for! Have a listen or google Linfield Learning Village.





Camdenville Public School Students Engineering Their Future

A group of Camdenville Public School students embarked on a Young Engineers mission to satisfy their curiosity, to explore and to become the next generation of creative-thinkers and problem-solvers.



Over the last 2 terms, our students learnt all about the world around them from Isaac Newton to his laws of motion, from gear ratios to symmetry, and many more...

Following the engineering process, students built prototypes of 20 different Lego models and they saw how things were made to move, the ability to change the speed of movement, and why the world existed the way it did. We built a washing machine and saw how centrifugal forces helped drain the water from the drum, we built a catapult and looked into kinetic and potential energy, and we built a hopping rabbit and saw the importance of symmetry in our machines.

We are so proud of their achievements and looking forward to another year of creative fun and learning with Bricks Challenge classes (years 1-5) continuing on Fridays from 8th February.
